### FROM DEACON MARK'S DESK

Chaos in the streets and everywhere else. A society aggressively hostile to the Catholic faith. A severe shortage of priests.

That scenario, which might seem somewhat familiar now, was what confronted St. Francis de Sales in the Savoy region of Switzerland more than 400 years ago. Yet those challenges were met and overcome through the saint's use of his gifts and his goodness. He still has much to teach us today as we approach his feast day, January 24.

Calvinists had overrun the diocese of Geneva, Switzerland, expelling Catholic clergy, closing churches and outlawing the practice of the Catholic faith. Francis was encouraged by an exiled bishop to become a priest in 1593. While Francis could not visit every place in the underground diocese, he used the talent he had developed as a university student: Writing.


He started by distributing leaflets about the Catholic religion and went on to write several books. The most notable was Introduction to the Devout Life, which became a best-seller and all-time classic. It remains valuable and relevant today because Francis explained how all of us are called to holiness in our own lives, our own circumstances.

Francis wrote that a bishop can't lead the solitary life of a monk. A married person cannot spend the entire day in prayer the way a religious does. He wrote that true devotion embellishes and enhances any calling or occupation, adding, "In whatever situation we happen to be, we can and we must aspire to the life of perfection."

Biographer Louise Stacpoole-Kenny called Francis "The Gentle Saint" and said that St. Vincent de Paul called Francis the best Christian he had ever met. It is said that by the end of Francis' time as bishop of Geneva, just about the entire diocese was converted back to the Catholic faith.

He was proclaimed a saint in 1665. Just over 100 years ago, he was declared patron saint of writers. That remains a cherished title. Some years ago, I was appointed by Bishop Murphy to the board of The Long Island Catholic newspaper (due to my own background in the newspaper business). When Bishop Murphy attended the meetings, he would open and close them with words that would still be beneficial for us: "St. Francis de Sales, pray for us."

#### THE DEMANDS OF DISCIPLESHIP

Today we encounter readings that already have a Lenten feel about them. Nineveh undergoes a forty-day fast, the psalmist reminds us that God alone can show sinners the way, Paul shows us how fleeting the things and events of this world are, and Jesus cries out "Repent!" before he calls his new followers. "Come after me," Jesus says, but if we are to truly live out the commands and demands of our discipleship through baptism, we must first know our need for conversion, our repentance, our need to believe in the gospel fully. Today's Gospel opens with the stark reminder of what befell John the Baptist for completely living out his vocation as the herald of Christ and the gospel: he was arrested, imprisoned, and martyred. Though few of us will experience consequences that extreme, we must all be ready to risk some sort of rejection as, heeding the call of Jesus, we live out the kingdom of God at hand, repent of our sins, and believe in the good news of salvation.
