




HELP WANTED!

FROM DEACON MARK'S DESK

Have you ever walked past a Cinnabon stand in an airport, taken a whiff of that sweet smell and decided you just had to stop and taste one of those buns? Or have you passed a pizza place, caught the aroma of the sauce and decided you just had to go in and buy a slice? Well, that is the same kind of action that sacramentals are meant to perform for us and our faith.

Sacramentals are different from the seven sacraments: Baptism, Reconciliation, Eucharist, Confirmation, Matrimony, Holy Orders and Anointing of the Sick. Those offer sanctifying grace in themselves. Sacramentals, with an emphasis on the "al." do not carry grace, but they are intentionally designed to make us take an inspired step toward the sacraments—and into deeper devotion.

The Vatican document Sacrosanctum Concilium says that sacramentals are "sacred signs that bear a resemblance to the sacraments." Included among the wide array of sacramentals in Catholic life are prayers, religious objects, gestures and activities. Among them are blessings, crucifixes, bells, rosary beads (and saying the rosary) and praying the Angelus.

Those and many more are included in the new book, "Compendium of Sacramentals" by Shaun McAfee, a convert to the Catholic faith, a lay Dominican and the founder and editor of EpicPew.com.

It is particularly timely to think about sacramentals during Lent, when they are at the forefront of our worship. Ashes on Ash Wednesday are arguably the most popular sacramental, judging by the attendance at church worldwide on that day. Lent also features the Stations of the Cross and palms on Palm Sunday. Here are other sacred signs:

- Holy Water dates back to Apostolic times.
- Making the Sign of the Cross is the chief sacramental, McAfee writes.
- Chalk is a sacramental used at homes on Epiphany.
- Blessed salt is used in several rituals, such as blessing of water to make it holy and in the Extraordinary form of Baptism.
- Holy oils are used in several sacraments and are blessed on Holy Thursday or another day during Holy Week.
- Scapulars come in several colors: brown, green, white, blue and black, each having been established after a separate and specific vision.

There is no doubt that people are drawn to sacramentals. Once, I was doing baptisms on St. Blaise Day, Feb. 3 and explained that it is an occasion to bless throats, using unlit candles (which also are sacramentals). Everyone in the church came up for that blessing, including young children and the professional photographer who was there to record the baptism for one family.

Sacramentals are a rich source of our Catholic tradition. We, as church, should make them as available as we can. We, as the faithful, should make use of them as often as we can. They lead us to the sacraments and they help us focus on God, who always is focused on us.

THE STAFF'S CORNER

Each month a highlight from a different Staff member will be found here. We hope you will enjoy getting to know your parish staff a little more through this column.

This month, we hear from Donna Cosme, our Religious Education Director.

I've been thinking a lot about the "Domestic Church," a phrase I have often encountered since taking on the role of DRE this past fall. So, what is the Domestic Church? Simply put, it is the family ... shining a light to God.

My grandmother was and still is (from Heaven) my family's domestic church. Her life was a testament to her faith in the Good News of the Gospel. I'd like to share a little bit about her.

Independent, strong and driven, my grandmother was born on Easter Sunday and was both devout & feisty (I loved that about her). She had a great devotion to the Blessed Mother, St. Francis, and St. Padre Pio (she actually met Padre Pio while visiting my grandfather's family in Italy). As a child, I saw grandma praying the rosary (and knitting) every day. Every morning & night she read from her worn out prayer books (which I now humbly have and treasure). She loved to tell us stories of the times she met angels and saints (yes, angels and saints). Sundays, Christmas, Easter, and birthdays at her house were wonderful celebrations meant for the family to come together to eat, talk, laugh...and eat some more.

Grandma was a member of the Catholic Daughters of the America's and a Third Order Franciscan. I have a beautiful picture of her from the day she was welcomed into the profession – she was so happy. She was deeply committed to volunteer work and always looked for ways to share her talents (of which she had many). My grandmother visited the local shrines often and Holy Thursday was an opportunity to visit 3 churches after Mass to spend time with Jesus at each one. It is still such a special day for me. The reality of Jesus' tremendous love for us is so incredible.

But for all her joys, she also had many hardships. Through it all though, she never lost her faith. My mom would later be that same beautiful witness to suffering with grace. What incredibly remarkable ladies they both were.


My Grandmother lived to the age of 98 and died in my arms. At the moment of her passing, she looked toward the window in her bedroom (next to which hung pictures of The Divine Mercy and The Resurrected Christ), opened her eyes wide as if she saw somebody she recognized and smiled. My mom and I believe that it was Jesus who she saw, coming to take her home.

Families come in many shapes, sizes, and wonderful forms. But the world is pulling families apart. Parents struggle for time and to make ends meet. Kids are pulled at the seams by the demands of modern culture. Extended family may not live close by. Sadly, the simplicity of the Gospel message is being overshadowed, and so the Domestic church is struggling. We as parents need to let our faith shine so that our children can be strengthened to face the challenges that we all must and know that God is standing right beside them always.

My grandmother passed on the treasure of the knowledge of God's love to our family. She and my parents were great examples of the Domestic Church in action—love, kindness, generosity, and respect. They taught me that no one is perfect. But God meets us in our brokenness and carries us through...if we let him. I pray that I continue to pass that treasure on to my children, grandchildren, and the families I have been blessed with the opportunity to serve as DRE.
