Dear ICC Family,



FROM DEACON JOE'S DESK ...

Saint Peter at the Gates A Reflection by Deacon Joe Byrne

We all know who guards the Pearly Gates, it's Saint Peter. And as Joseph approached the Gates, Saint Peter did a strange thing, he closed them. Joseph had no idea what was going on and so he said, "Hay Pete, what's up?" Now Saint Peter was no help at all, he just said, "Wait over there."

Joseph turned to take a look at where Peter was pointing and when he turned back Saint Peter was nowhere to be found. Now, the first thing that Joseph did was go and check those gates. They were locked. Then Joseph started to look around and he noticed as he looked from one thing to the next, he found it was always more beautiful than the last thing he looked at. He was thrilled.

As Joseph is doing this, Saint Peter is looking for someone in heaven and when he spots the guy he is looking for, he goes up to him and whispers over his shoulder, "He's at the gate." With that, this guy takes off, like a bat out of hell, racing for the gate. Now Joseph is still admiring everything he can see but out of the corner of his eye, he notices this guy racing down the path. The first thought in his mind is, "If he slips, he is really going to hurt himself." So Joseph goes to the middle of the path, plants his feet, raises his arms, starts waiving them, and shouts, "Slow down, the gate's closed." With that, this guy stops on a dime right in front of him, big smile on his face and says, "Joseph, I came to welcome you."

At the sound of his name Joseph knew exactly who this guy was, and he said, "O Jesus, I was hoping to bump into you up here. I have some questions for you." Still smiling, Jesus said, "Ya Joseph, I know, let's go sit under that tree that Peter likes so much, and talk about your life." When Saint Peter got back to the gate, he can't hear what they're saying, but he knows when they hit the happy parts because he can see the smiles and the laughter. He knows when they hit the sad parts because he can see the tears and the sobs. He knows when they hilt the really hilarious parts because he can see the belly laughs.

And he knows when Joseph is asking those questions that he wants answers to because he could see Joseph resting his chin on his hand and the nodding of heads as questions were answered and explanations were given. It was a long and deep conversation. And when they were done, they got up and headed to the gate and Peter hears Jesus say, "Come on Joseph let's check out your new digs and there are a lot of people up here waiting to wrap you in their love and welcome you."

The point of the reflection is that Joseph is alive in a new way in your heart, just as Jesus is. So, pray for him and pray to him. And Peace be with every one of you.

This is a reflection I use at most Vigil Services and graveside committals that I preside at. Feel free to substitute the name of a loved one who has gone back home and is engaged in a deep conversation with Jesus.





TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The second Sunday of Lent every year recalls the Transfiguration of the Lord. Since the fourth century, Mount Tabor has been the focus of devotion to this event. As mountains go, it is not particularly lofty, rising about fifteen hundred feet, within view of the Sea of Galilee and very close to Nazareth. Scripture doesn't identify the mountain, but in the year 348 Saint Cyril of Jerusalem said he preferred Mount Tabor to Mount Hermon as the site of the Transfiguration, and his opinion won. It has long been a strategic military site, and ancient fortresses are visible on the heights. Over **Transfiguration of the Lord** the centuries, churches and fortified monasteries rose on the

mountaintop, only to be destroyed by various invaders. Six

hundred years ago, local Christians started to decorate the ruins with flags and banners on the Feast of the Transfiguration. In 1631, the Sultan granted permission to the Franciscans to live on Mount Tabor, and they have been there ever since, discovering the ruins of an old Crusader church and constructing the present church on the site in 1924.

The top of the mountain is divided into Greek Orthodox and Latin (that's us) zones. At one time, tourists arrived on the summit by bus, but this is no longer permitted. Some ride bicycles up a challenging and winding path, while others take the four thousand three hundred steps constructed for Christian pilgrims in the fourth century. It's hard to imagine the fishermen following Jesus up this craggy mountain without complaint. Visitors will sympathize with Peter's plan to construct booths and stay put with Jesus, Moses, and Elijah for a while, enjoying the view, and planning the trip back down.
